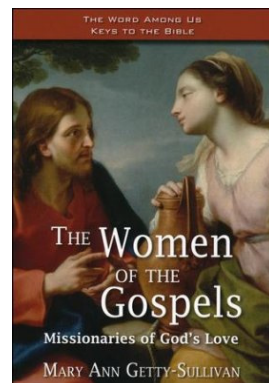

Blessed are the merciful and pure of heart
Matthew 5:7-8

According to Jesus, perfect blessedness/happiness requires internal transformation by the Holy Spirit that results in: 1) Complete dependence upon God; 2) Mourning over the world's and personal brokenness; 3) A meekness/humility that regards God's will being done as better than ours being done; 4) An ever-increasing hunger and thirst for justice to be satisfied in our lives and the world; 5) Understanding that justice is best accomplished through corporal and spiritual works of mercy.

As the Spirit cultivates the above in us, then we may be considered people with a pure/clean or undivided heart. Meaning that we have become a people who only desire what God desires for the world and ourselves. It is then that we are ready to embrace God's mission for us in the world, no matter the cost, and experience true and perfect happiness.

If you desire this in your life, remember, the liturgy is the starting point. For the liturgy is "the font from which all her (the Church's) power flows", "especially in the Eucharist through which Christ Jesus works in fullness for the transformation of men." CCC, 1074

Catechism Catechesis

I. The Father-Source and Goal of the Liturgy

1077 "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places, even as he chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and blameless before him. He destined us before him in love to be his sons through Jesus Christ, according to the purpose of his will, to the praise of his glorious grace which he freely bestowed on us in the Beloved."

1078 Blessing is a divine and life-giving action, the source of which is the Father; his blessing is both word and gift. When applied to man, the word "blessing" means adoration and surrender to his Creator in thanksgiving.

1079 From the beginning until the end of time the whole of God's work is a blessing. From the liturgical poem of the first creation to the canticles of the heavenly Jerusalem, the inspired authors proclaim the plan of salvation as one vast divine blessing.
