Thirty Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, November 17-18, 2018

**Formed by the Gospels
Perfect Happiness & Persecution
Matthew 5:10-12**

According to Jesus, we experience perfect happiness when persecuted for performing works of mercy in Jesus's name that satisfy justice. Persecution stands at the summit of Jesus's Beatitudes; a persecution for which Jesus exhorts the persecuted to rejoice and be glad in. How can that be? How is it possible that persecution can result in perfect happiness?

As with the other Beatitudes, recall that Jesus embodied them all in his first century ministry (and still embodies them to this day, especially in the Sacrifice of the Mass and when people receive works of mercy outside of Mass, see Matthew 25). A reading of the Gospels shows that Jesus regularly experienced persecution for lovingly performing corporal and spiritual works of mercy, i.e. forgiving sins, healing on the Sabbath, instructing the ignorant. Jesus experienced his most extreme persecution in his torture and crucifixion, in the midst of which he manifested the highest degree of love when praying that his enemies be forgiven.

For Jesus, perfect happiness is found where perfect love and persecution meet, for it is when experiencing the worst persecution possible that the highest possible love can be expressed, and perfect happiness is experienced in the highest act of love. If that is so for Jesus, then, of course, that must also be true for us who are being conformed to his image through the Mass, sacraments, a life of virtue, and prayer. We will see what this looks like in every day life in the rest of the Sermon on the Mount in the weeks to come.

Catechism Catechesis

... from the time of the Church of the Apostles ...

1086 "Accordingly, just as Christ was sent by the Father so also he sent the apostles, filled with the Holy Spirit. This he did so that they might preach the Gospel to every creature and proclaim that the Son of God by his death and resurrection had freed us from the power of Satan and from death and brought us into the Kingdom of his Father. But he also willed that the work of salvation which they preached should be set in train through the sacrifice and sacraments, around which the entire liturgical life revolves."

1087 Thus the risen Christ, by giving the Holy Spirit to the apostles, entrusted to them his power of sanctifying: they became sacramental signs of Christ. By the power of the same Holy Spirit they entrusted this power to their successors. This "apostolic succession" structures the whole liturgical life of the Church and is itself sacramental, handed on by the sacrament of Holy Orders.
