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



What does it mean to light a candle?

Essential to Catholic Celebrations

In most every part of Catholic celebrations and rituals, lighting of candles play a very significant role. Candles are lighted during the celebration of the Mass, on liturgical and funeral processions and evening prayer ceremonies. Candles are lit before the Tabernacle to signify the Lord's presence in the Blessed Sacrament and to call for reverence on the part of the faithful.



Significant in Judaism

In Judaism, a perpetual light was kept burning in the Temple and the synagogues not only to insure the ability to light other candles or oil lamps in the evening but also to show the presence of God (Exodus 27:20-21 and Leviticus 24:2-4). Later, the Talmud prescribed a lit lamp at the Ark, where the Torah and other writings of Sacred Scripture were kept, to show reverence to the Word of God. This practice probably influenced our own tradition of having a lit (Red Sanctuary Candle) candle near the Tabernacle to indicate the presence of and to show reverence for the Blessed Sacrament.

Pre-Dates Written History

Christians adapted the use of lit candles for Mass, liturgical processions, evening prayer ceremonies, funeral processions, and, again, to show reverence to the reserved Blessed Sacrament. Moreover, there is evidence that lit candles or oil lamps were burned at the tombs of saints, particularly martyrs, by the 200s, and before sacred images and relics by the 300s. However, this practice probably existed well before our available written evidence.

A Symbol of Christ

In our Catholic tradition, in early times as well as today, light has a special significance — Christ. Recall Jesus said, "I am the light of the world. No follower of mine shall ever walk in darkness; no, he shall possess the light of life" (John 8:12) and "I have come to the world as its light, to keep anyone who believes in me from remaining in the dark" (John 12:46).

In our liturgy for the Sacrament of Baptism, the priest presents a candle lit from the Paschal candle, which in turn symbolizes the Paschal mystery, and says to the newly baptized, "You have been enlightened by Christ. Walk always as children of the light and keep the flame of faith alive in your hearts. When the Lord comes, may you go out to meet him with all the saints in the heavenly kingdom" (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). The light is a symbol of Christ Himself.

The Light Is A Reminder to Stay Present to the Lord

With this background, we can appreciate the usage of votive candles. Here, as in early Christian times, we light a candle before a statue or sacred image of our Lord or of a saint. Of course, we do not honor the statue or the image itself, but whom that statue or image represents. The light signifies our prayer offered in faith coming into the light of God— allowing us to be filled with His light. With the light of faith, we petition our Lord in prayer, or petition the saint for intercession— to pray with us and for us to the Lord. The light also shows a special reverence and our desire to remain present to the Lord in prayer even though we may depart and go about our daily business. https://www.saintpats.org/parish/catholics-light-votive-candles/



Are you receiving the Eucharist?

Reasons why one may not be receiving the Eucharist.

Confession?


Because the Eucharist is a sign, symbol, and expression of communion with God, the Church has always taught that a person who is conscious of grave sin should not ordinarily receive the Eucharist without first making a sacramental confession.

Confession times are every Saturday beginning at 3:00 pm or by appointment.

Marriage?

We [bishops] understand the pain of those for whom divorce seemed the only recourse. We urge them to make frequent use of the sacraments, especially the Sacraments of Holy Eucharist and Reconciliation if you are divorced and not remarried or cohabitating. We encourage divorced persons who wish to marry in the Catholic Church to seek counsel about the options that exist to remedy their situation, including the suitability of a declaration of nullity when there is no longer any hope of reconciliation of the spouses.

The food pantry operates every Wednesday from 4 to 5:15 or later if there are more people to serve. The only Wednesdays we are not open are the Wednesday before Thanksgiving or if a holiday falls on a Wednesday. We usually have 7 volunteers working each week. We have (4) packing food boxes according to family size and (3) that work in the Parish Hall entering the clients in the computer, writing their information on a log sheet or greeting and handing numbers out to those waiting in their cars. Volunteers usually work once a month unless we are short on volunteers.

Thanks to the parish's support we serve 150 or more families a month. Sacred Heart donates food monthly and we have a few volunteers from Sacred Heart that work in the hall or pantry.



Planning the Funeral Rites

On occasion a Catholic dies before sharing with family members or friends his/her wishes concerning a funeral and burial. In such a case, the person may be buried without a Catholic funeral or even before the parish knows of the death. In order that family, friends and your parish church understand your wishes in regard to the Funeral Rites of the Catholic Church, please prayerfully consider the information and questions provided Funeral Planning Book (Available at the parish office). The parish representatives are happy to meet with you and any family members to explain the Rites and the choices that are available in planning the liturgies.

Several reasons to consider pre-planning a funeral:

- You decide exactly what kind of funeral and burial you want. This includes but is not limited to scripture readings and liturgical music
- Your family or friends won't have to make decisions during an already difficult time
- Avoid any confusion or misunderstandings from family members or friends unfamiliar with Catholic funeral rites
- Avoid unnecessary costs one could incur when working with a funeral home and/or cemetery. Even
 if a person elects not to pre-finance their funeral home or cemetery choices, having those choices
 identified is important
- Consider pre-planning your funeral as a final gift to your loved ones at the time of your death.

"At the death of a Christian, whose life of faith was begun in the waters of Baptism and strengthened at the Eucharistic table, the Church intercedes on behalf of the deceased because of its confident belief that death is not the end, nor does it break the bonds forged in life. The Church also ministers to the sorrowing and consoles them in the funeral rites with the comforting Word of God and the Sacrament of the Eucharist." (Order of Christian Funerals, no. 4)

- Plan your funeral—choose your readings & songs (please pick up a funeral planning book at the office—or we can email you a digital copy)
- Make arrangements with Mt. Calvary Catholic Cemetery 541 331 1416.
- Set up your will or trust (ensure estate division fairness) state your wishes, take time to have the hard conversations and minimize family conflict. (Oregon Will requirements)

How can I memorize like Charles?

Full disclosure, this is Julie's question idea, but I am glad to give an answer. For me, memorizing begins with motivation. Before I memorize portions from Scripture or the Catechism, I first experience an intense drive to memorize it. For example, prior to Lent 2024, I began experiencing an intense desire to memorize the Gospel of Matthew chapters 5 – 7, the so-called Sermon on the Mount. So, on Ash Wednesday in the wee hours of the morning, I first prayerfully read Matthew 5-7 in full, then I memorized a few verses from chapter 5 before going out for a run. During my run, I prayed those verses repeatedly until I KNEW them, not just memorized them. Then, the next morning I read through Matthew 5-7 again and memorized a few more verses and prayed all that I had

memorized from chapter 5 while I ran. Also, whenever I would walk somewhere, like to the Parish Office for work and back home, I would pray through all that I had memorized, again and again. One more important activity I performed while memorizing those verses and chapters, I read and seriously studied the Hebrew Bible, books on the Jewish faith, and commentaries on the Gospel of Matthew. I have found over the years that the better I understand the Scripture and books of Scripture as a whole, the easier it is for me to memorize and know them. The same goes for the Catechism.

Well, by the time Lent concluded, I had not only memorized Matthew 5-7, but I KNEW those chapters. Now, whenever I walk or run, I just keep praying and meditating upon those chapters and the LORD blesses me with exhilarating insights that I then have the opportunity to share with others. So, this is how I memorize in a nutshell:

- Experience an intense desire to memorize a passage.
- Begin memorizing one or a few verses or sentences at a time.
- Right away, begin praying through all that has been memorized, again and again.
- Simultaneously, prayerfully read and study Scripture and the Catechism as a whole, and prayerfully read and study other high-quality sources on the topic being studied.

As you can see, I work tremendously hard to memorize and know Scripture, the Catechism, or anything else that I have been given an intense desire to learn. This takes many, many hours of heartfelt work, prayer and meditation, and....running and walking! That understood, this practice has enriched my mind and life in ways beyond description. Every ounce of effort has been more than worth it.

Gardening Tips

Late Summer Watering...

- Thoroughly soak your containers.
- ♦ Water early morning hours or late evening.
- ♦ Water every other day.
- ♦ Water *daily* when temperatures are sustained and above 88-90 degrees.
- When temperatures start to fall, adjust the watering schedule back down.
- Deadhead your plants often.
- ♦ Fertilize about every 2-3 weeks for best results.
- Trim any plants that are "Leggy" or "scruffy" looking and tidy up your container (s).
- Trim them back significantly to promote new growth going into Fall.
- When nightly temperatures drop below 40, adjust your watering again and only water in the mornings.

As you may know, SMHA provides many services to the surrounding villages (approx. 50,000 people) including medical treatment through the monastery dispensary, regional transportation, and education (operating two secondary schools, one primary school, and one co-ed school). SMHA also assists the community in many other areas of need such as helping families get out of poverty and pursuing development projects that provide long-term sustainability. In 2004 a "clean water" project was established that helped bring clean water from the mountains to the surrounding villages. Clean water saves lives and helps reduce the high infant mortality rate that is caused by contaminated water. The abbey continues to work hard at bringing clean safe drinking water by drilling wells and installing hand pumps not only for the surrounding villages, but other villages at large. The funds of this event will go towards the "clean water" project and much needed dispensary enhancements.





Pro-life Candidates Make Impressive Showing in 2024 Primary Election

Pro-life candidates who earned the endorsement of Oregon Right to Life Political Action Committee won impressive victories throughout Oregon in the 2024 primary election.

Oregon Right to Life PAC (ORTL PAC) supported 79 candidates in the primary election, making 76 endorsements and three recommendations. Of the supported candidates, 67 will move forward thanks to strong pro-life turnout in the May 21 primary.

"Pro-life candidates truly swept to victory in this election," Oregon Right to Life Executive Director Lois Anderson said on election night. "After tonight's results, we can look forward with confidence to the general election in November."

In one of the most significant wins of the night, pro-life and ORTL PAC-endorsed candidate Darin Harbick (R) defeated incumbent Representative Charlie Conrad (R-Dexter) in House District 12. ORTL PAC launched a campaign against Conrad in June of 2023 after he voted for a far-reaching bill that, among its most egregious provisions, would have allowed abortion providers to perform the procedure on young girls without their parents' knowledge or consent.

Harbick beat Conrad overwhelmingly, taking home more than 82 percent of the vote.

Darin Harbick was among six ORTL PAC-endorsed state representative candidates who won pro-life victories in contested races. ORTL PAC-endorsed candidates also claimed wins in contested Senate races where the sitting pro-life senators were barred from running for re-election after their historic walkout protesting radical pro-abortion legislation.

Todd Nash scored a victory in Senate District 29, Noah Robinson replaced his father Sen. Art Robinson (R-Cave Junction) in Senate District 2 and Diane Linthicum replaced her husband and Republican Secretary of State nominee, Sen. Dennis Linthicum (R-Klamath Falls), in Senate District 28.

ORTL PAC also endorsed candidates in 35 contested races. Of these, 27 races will move forward with a strong pro-life candidate, three of whom already won outright.

"Oregon's abortion and assisted suicide laws are radical and out of touch," Anderson says. "This election once again proves that ordinary Oregonians support sensible pro-life candidates and common sense protections for our state's most vulnerable, including the unborn and medically vulnerable adults."

Oregon Right to Life is deeply grateful for the support and dedication of pro-life advocates throughout our state who helped ensure victory for the many winning pro-life candidates from the May 21 election.

Ontario's Hope Pregnancy Center Uniquely Situated for Impact

Hector Juarez loves to ask men and women coming out of the ultrasound room at Hope Pregnancy Center (HPC) in Ontario what they just saw.

"Many times, they are emotional, and they come back and say, 'This changes everything,'" says Juarez, the center's director since 2018. "Even though this area is very rural, with our population being just over 11,000, we've had over 25,000 client visits and performed around 860 ultrasounds. We have seen God use us to minister to so many people."

The center opened in 1986 and has been at its third and current location on 6th Street in the Oregon border town since 2010. HPC offers free pregnancy testing, ultrasounds, pregnancy counseling to discuss the family's options, community education, maternity and baby gear, STD testing and resource referrals.

"We're dealing with a life-and-death issue here, because humans are made in the image of God," Juarez says. "The world is really good at shutting the opposition down and calling us names, but human life is a gift from our maker."

It's a very personal issue to Juarez, who paid for the abortion of his own child when he was a teenager.

"It broke my heart for many years, and it wasn't until Christ found me that that area of my life was redeemed," he says. "When I started at Hope Pregnancy Center meeting with men through the men's ministry before I became the director, I felt this very intimate connection because I could see myself in them."

HPC is minutes away from Idaho, a state that effectively banned abortion (with exceptions to save the mother's life or in cases of rape and incest) in 2022 after the overturning of Roe v. Wade. That means that a significant number of pregnant Idahoans will travel to Oregon, one of the most abortion-friendly states in the nation, to abort their children. HPC has seen a 41 percent increase in abortion-minded or abortion-vulnerable clients, in fact, since the Dobbs decision that returned abortion regulation to individual states. Juarez says that many Idaho clients come to Ontario looking for an abortion, scared of Idaho laws or simply confused.

"Yesterday, we had a female client come who drove from Idaho, intending to get an abortion in Oregon," Juarez says. "Thankfully, somebody intervened and encouraged her not to go through with it. She is still very abortion-minded, but we offered her an ultrasound and had staff meet and pray with her."

To adapt to Oregon's "abortion tourism" realities, Juarez says that HPC is looking to expand its hours, client services (including hiring another nurse for sonography), online advertising and influence with local churches and community stakeholders in the very near future. Since 2010, at least 161 babies have been saved from abortion because of HPC's services — but Juarez and his team want that number to massively increase.

"We're giving these women and families more information about their child, about their options, about the laws," Juarez says. "We're delivering compassionate care, because we're not just trying to promote a pro-life message, but an *abundant* pro-life message."
